

Looking for **New Routes**

It is the year 1524. You are a French sailor who has spent weeks in a small wooden boat crossing the Atlantic Ocean. You have no idea what lies ahead. No European has ever sailed to this place before. You hope that the people of the region will be friendly. Later your captain writes:

"So we took the small boat up the river to a land which we found densely [thickly] populated. The people . . . came toward us joyfully, uttering loud cries of wonderment..."

© Europeans Reach the Americas

In the late 1400s, Europeans began to look for a water route to the rich spice markets found in Asia. An explorer travels to unfamiliar places to find out about them. One explorer, Christopher Columbus, thought he could reach Asia by sailing westward across the Atlantic Ocean. In 1492, instead of Asia, Columbus sailed to the Bahama Islands in the Caribbean Sea. Columbus did not realize that he had reached a world Europeans knew nothing about.

The First Europeans in New York

By the 1500s, many more explorers came to North America and the land of New York. These Europeans believed that there must be a Northwest Passage, a water route across North America to reach Asia. The country that found this water

route would grow rich from trade with Asia.

Giovanni da Verrazano

You read the words of Giovanni da Verrazano (joh VAHN nee duh vair uh ZAHN oh) at the beginning of this lesson. Although an Italian sea captain, he sailed for the king of France in 1524. He did not find the Northwest Passage, but he was probably the first European to see what is now New York. Verrazano realized he was not in Asia, but he hoped this new land might have riches and products for Europeans to buy. Today a part of New York Harbor north of Staten Island is called Verrazano Narrows in this explorer's honor.
